COP COMING OCTOBER 5 AND 6!

The California QSO Party (CQP) is the premier state QSO party held every year on the first weekend of October. The Northern California Contest Club (NCCC) has sponsored CQP since 1974. CQP has traditionally opened the annual contest season by providing an opportunity for contesters to prepare for the ARRL November Sweepstakes since the format is similar. Stations outside of California, worldwide, work stations in California only. The 58 counties of CA are the multipliers. California stations work all stations in or out of CA. The 50 US states and 8 Canadian provinces are the multipliers. Stations outside of Canada and the US add to one's QSO total but do not count as multipliers. See the full set of CQP Rules for more details.

This is a fun contest for club members who want to see how operations are done on high frequency (HF) radios, even if your license restricts you to non HF bands.

Scouting's Jamboree on the Air 2013 Coming Soon

The 2013 running of Scouting's Jamboree on the Air (**JOTA**) is just weeks away. The 56th JOTA will take place the weekend of October 19-20, from 0000 local time Saturday to 2400 local time Sunday. JOTA gives members of the **Boy Scouts of America** a chance to experience Amateur Radio firsthand, perhaps planting the seed for a lifetime of hamming.

The world's largest Scouting event, JOTA attracts nearly 750,000 Scouts participating from 6000 stations in 150 countries. Not a contest, JOTA's goal is to foster Scout-to-Scout communication across borders.

"The idea is to contact other Scout stations and allow as many Scouts as possible to talk to other Scouts and learn about who they are and what they are doing," the BSA says in its **JOTA guidelines**, which offer

suggested frequencies. Licensed mentors often open their stations to Scouts on JOTA weekend, serving as control operators. Radio operation will be on 80 through 6 meters and 2 meters and 70 centimeters FM simplex, all modes.

Through its Radio Scouting sponsorship, **Icom America** is providing stations for JOTA and other Scouting events, including the loan of five stations that will be on the air for JOTA 2013.

Last year more than 18,500 US Scouts took part in JOTA from more than 200 stations -- up by nearly 500 percent from a year earlier.

DX Contacts for the CW Challenged

Do you wish to rack up some DX on CW but lack the poise and confidence (not to mention proficiency) to dive in and "have a go at it"? If that is the case then here is how to start getting those DX CW QSL cards rolling in.

The first thing you need is a viable HF station that is capable of making DX contacts. That would be a transceiver that can put out 100w, has a CW mode, a decent receiver, and preferably a built-in keyer. You will also need a reasonable antenna, a CW key or paddles, and comfortable headphones.

Now you must have a rudimentary knowledge of CW and at least be able to recognize your own call (N6LHL) and 599 at 5 wpm (-. -.... -...) (..... -. -..) Also note that DX and Contest operators actually send 5NN. You really need to be able to recognize your own call at a faster rate but 5 wpm should keep you from being too much of a speed bump. If you cannot send and receive your call and 599 then you must practice until you can.

Now you check the magazines and ham web sites for scheduled CW contests. Once you select a contest go to the contest rules and carefully read the required exchange so that you can give a proper response. As a beginner it is recommended that contests using a contact serial number be avoided (the DX super stations that you will want in your log will be in the 3 digit numbers in a couple of hours). This leaves you two major contests to get into;

- 1. The CQWW DX CW which has an exchange of your RST and your zone. For California we are in zone3. So the reply is 599 3 (..... -. -. ...-). This contest is usually the 4th weekend in November.
- 2. The ARRL Int DX CW which has an exchange of your RST and your state. For us in California it is CA. So the reply is 599 CA (..... -. -. -. -. -.). This contest is usually the 3rd weekend in February.

Now you write out in plain text and in CW your reply to a contest station when he answers you. Put this page directly in front of your key/paddle and you're ready to go after some DX on CW!!!

As a beginner you should generally avoid the first hours of a contest. Also avoid the lower portions of your band as that is where the speed burners hang out.

Tune around until you hear a DX station calling -.-. -.. - (CQ Test) repeated and followed by a call sign. Select a station who is getting few (if any) contacts. Since this guy needs contacts the odds of him working you are very good. You may need to listen for a few minutes to get his call but it is an extremely important step...you may get only one letter (or number) each tine he sends his CQ TEST Call but you will get it all eventually.

Your next step is to send your call sign one time at the end of a CQ Test. When he comes back with your call sign you send your pre-scripted -. -. (599) plus any other required exchange (zone, state, etc). If he comes back with .- -.. -. (AGN) repeat your call sign. When he comes back with your call and 599 send your pre-scripted exchange. He will either send - ..- (TU), CW for thank you, or resume calling CQ. Now log him and go for more!!!

DXpedition CW

When trying to work a large DXpedition the procedure is basically the same but there are some major changes required in your approach.

- 1. Do some research on the internet on scheduled DXpeditions that you need for your CW DXCC award. The larger the group is and the longer they'll be at the DX location greatly increases your chance for success.
- 2. Once you have selected an event you should study propagation to the country you will be working. If you are using a wire antenna you need to assure that you get it oriented to the DX target. In the weeks prior to the event you need to listen on various bands to get a good idea of what band (or bands) are open to the DX target and the times of the openings.
- 3. When actual operation of the DXpedition starts you need to check the DX spots on the internet to know where they are operating. Then you must **listen**, **listen**, **and listen some more!!!** There will be massive pile-ups with lots of rude people and you must learn to ignore these idiots and concentrate on the DX.
- 4. Most DXpeditions operate split frequency on all modes (CW,SSB, RTTY, etc). You need to know where he is listening so you'll know where to transmit. In the CW mode the operator usually sends ..- .--. (up) which means he is listening up 1 to 10 Kc. As time passes and the pile-ups abate the split will become less and less. After a couple of weeks he'll probably send ..- .--. (up 2) and mean it. If the DXpedition is there for 3 or more weeks they'll be begging for QSOs the last few days, then you got'em!!!
- 5. The K9W DXpedition to Wake Island is scheduled for the month of October this year. The duration has yet to be published but it'll probably be 2 weeks. Your mission is to work them on at least 2 bands on CW. You can also work them on SSB too.
