



WARTIME RADIO: THE SECRET LISTENERS

Bob, K6ON recently shared this on-line video gem. Illustrated with archival film and photographs, as well as interviews with those involved, the documentary traces the evolution of civilian involvement in radio-based intelligence during both world wars.

It was the tireless work of amateur radio enthusiasts during World War I, that initially convinced the Admiralty to establish a radio intercept station at Hunstanton. Playing an integral role during the war, technological advances meant that radio operators could pinpoint signals, thus uncovering the movement of German boats, leading to the decisive Battle of Jutland in 1916.

Wireless espionage was to play an even more important role during World War II, with the Secret Intelligence Service setting up the Radio Security Service, which was staffed by Voluntary Interceptors, a band of amateur radio enthusiasts scattered across Britain. The information they collected was interpreted by some of the brightest minds in the country, who also had a large hand in deceiving German forces by feeding false intelligence. If you are need of transportation to and from the meeting, please contact Paul, N6KZW or John, NZ6Q and we will arrange transportation assistance for you.








KINGDON DRAG RACE REPORT!!

Connecticut credit is given only for working W1AW/1 in Connecticut. A W1AW WAS certificate and a plaque will be available.

Endorse the W1AW WAS Certificate with the Territorial Stickers for working W1AW/KG4, W1AW/KH2, W1AW/KP4, W1AW/KP2, and any others that may be active, and also endorse with W1AW/3 from the District of Columbia.





SCOUTING 57TH ANNUAL JAMBOREE ON-THE-AIR OCTOBER 18TH – 19TH

The 2014 Jamboree On The Air (**JOTA**) is set for the October 18-19 weekend. An annual Scouting event, JOTA links Scouts around the world via Amateur Radio. More than a half million Scouts and Guides get together over the airwaves for the annual Jamboree-on-the-Air (JOTA).

According to the World Scout Bureau, JOTA is the largest Scouting event in the world, with nearly 750,000 Scouts participating from 6000 stations in 150 countries around the world. Scouts of any age can participate, from Cub Scouts to Boy Scouts and Venture crew members. This is not a contest. JOTA's goal is to foster Scout-to-Scout communication across borders and oceans. "The idea is to contact other Scout stations and allow as many Scouts as possible to talk to other Scouts and learn about who they are and what they are doing," the **Boy Scouts of America** says in its **JOTA guidelines**.

On-the-air exchanges typically include such information as name, location, Scout rank, age, and hobbies, but the conversation can certainly go beyond that. Amateur Radio licensees should be aware that international third-party traffic **agreements** may prohibit direct person-to-person communication between unlicensed individuals in certain other countries.



ARRL OFFERS NEW FREE ON-LINE TESTING

The ARRL has launched a new online resource that allows users to take randomly generated practice exams using questions from the actual examination question pool. **ARRL Exam Review for Ham Radio**TM is *free*, and users do *not* need to be ARRL members. The only requirement is that users must first set up a site login. Check it out at http://www.arrl.org/exam-practice

While ARRL Exam Review is being introduced with the new, third edition of the Technician study guide, *The ARRL Ham Radio License Manual*, the site also supports practice examinations for General and Amateur Extra. The on-line exam practice provides different review options, so you can choose to review by chapter of the study manual or by question pool topic. Short explanations are provided to help you understand the correct answer. The software also provides the option to produce-- and print-- as many practice exams as you would like.



GREAT CALIFORNIA SHAKE-OUT EARTHQUAKE DRILL OCTOBER 16th 10:16AM

The Stockton-Delta Amateur Radio Club will join 101 other volunteer radio groups statewide to participate in the 2014 Great California Shake Out Earthquake Preparedness Exercise.

Club members and other local hams are encouraged to take a 10 minute break from their job on Thursday, October 16th at 10:16AM and check into the 147.165Mhz W6SF repeater. Ed, N6XMA will be net control station. The exercise should take 5 to 10 minutes to complete and what a great way to demonstrate amateur radio to your boss, coworkers and friends.

Please check in with your location and "damage assessment" as well as response capabilities of your station. A typical check in might sound like this:

(after acknowledgement by net control) "This is NZ6Q, John in North Stockton, minimal local damage, available for mobile response with 2M/440/HF mobile and 2M/440 portables".

Twitter: another tool in the ham radio toolbox

It all starts innocently enough. You get a computer to do your logging, and before you know it, you're working digital modes. Then, you snake an Ethernet cable down to the shack or connect to your wireless router. Pretty soon, you can't do without having a browser window open to one of the DX clusters or ReverseBeacon.Net or QRZ.Com or all three simultaneously.

Well, now's there another Internet service that I can't do without down in the shack: Twitter! I get on Twitter all the time now when I'm in the shack, and I love it. It's truly enhanced my amateur radio experience.

One of the ways it's done this is by bringing me all kinds of interesting technical information. I not only follow @hackaday and @DIYEngineering, and @EDN.Com, but a bunch of hams who are doing fun things. I hate to list some, for fear of leaving some out, but I will give a shout out to @NT7S, @AA7EE, @mightyohm, @caulktel, @LA3ZA. There's even @HiramPMaxim (the P stands for "parody"). If you go to my blog at KB6NU.Com and search for "From my Twitter feed," you'll find links to some of the most interesting Tweets that have found their way to me.

I'm also following a couple of amateur radio retailers. Today, for example, @DXEngineering is offering \$55 off the RigExpert AA-54 Antenna Analyzer.

I also use it to get information about weather conditions and band conditions. For example, I follow @edvielmetti, who is KD8OQG. He's always tweeting about local severe weather. A Tweet from him gets me to turn on my 2m radio to monitor the local SkyWarn net.

As far as band conditions go, I throw out a Tweet, asking about band conditions, and in seconds, I'll get reports from my followers here in the U.S. and around the world. I try to do my part as well. When I fire up the rig, I'll Tweet out a report of how the bands seem to me.

While all of this is great, it's really all about the people. I currently have more 2,200 followers and I follow more than 900. I would never have met some of these hams if it wasn't for Twitter, and I have since worked several of them on the air after first meeting them on Twitter. Last May, we had a "Tweetup" at the Dayton Hamvention. There were at least 20 of us there. How cool is that?

Twitter isn't for everyone, but I'd encourage you to give it a try. I'm having a lot of fun on Twitter, and I think you will, too. If you do set up a Twitter account, please follow me, @kb6nu. If you mention that you read this column, I'll be sure to follow you back.
