HAM CRAM RESULTS FOR 2017

I want to thank everyone who helped out this year with becoming VEs for both Laurel and ARRL VECs. Also without your help, the Elmer University sessions would not have been successful.

So here are some stats on HamCram results for 2017. This is our Stockton session, the Tracy HamCram and "special event" test sessions that were held at the request of a club or organization.

The totals: New techs: 93 New generals: 22 New extras:13

Total number of people served: 142

(Some people took all three tests over the course of the year and each test counted as being serve if the examinations were on different days.)

This last figure needs to be explained. While many people did fail test during the year, many actually went on to successfully pass at a later venue.

Number of people failing to upgrade at an examination session: 29

Grand total of people getting licenses or upgrades: 128

Our pass rate appears to be 97.3%.

My thanks to the club for their vote in October to sponsor a complimentary one year membership to those new hams we license at our sessions. One of the primary missions of the club should be to foster interest in the hobby to the youth and newly licensed. Club meeting attendance like the one pictured here can be a great opportunity to create new friends, spark interest in new technologies as well as teach others about this great hobby.

The call sign is W6SF, and can be heard on **147.165+**Mhz with a PL tone of 107.2 Hz. From the same site, the club also operates a 440MHZ repeater at **442.250 +** with a PL of 107.2 Hz.

The club also operates a UHF repeater located in downtown Stockton **444.575MHz +** with a PL 107.2Hz. Coverage includes the Stockton area as well as parts of Lodi, Manteca, Tracy and Ripon.
