

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### We are a Hobby We are a National Resource We are Life Savers

I had the privilege recently of helping out with an Emergency Preparedness Fair sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (the Mormons). We set up a go box, demonstrated a few portable radios, and continuously played several public service videos in the background. During the 4 hours we were "on-the-air" we answered a lot of questions.

- Q: "I thought cell phones (or the internet) replaced you guys a long time ago" A: "No. Actually there are more hams licensed today than ever before, using better technology than ever before"
- Q: "What do you guys do anyway?" A: "We save lives" Q: "HUH?" A: "Besides talk to people all over the world, we train, we prepare, we experiment and we stand ready in a disaster to assist not just with radios, but with a pool of resourceful minded professionals (who are Amateurs)"
- Q: "Wow, I remember my neighbor having a wall of hardware in his garage growing up. Do you need all of that stuff still today" A: "No, modern ham equipment has gotten much better, smaller and cheaper"
- Q: "I thought it cost a lot of money to get started" A: "Not really, most 'entry level' radios can be purchased for less than \$100"
- Q: "Why would I need a ham radio in an emergency? Who would I be able to talk to?" A: "Most communication networks rely heavily on the internet, power grid and other resources which can easily be overrun in an emergency or fail completely. Ham radio may be the only link you have. You can talk with your friends, neighbors, and hams assisting in emergency response."

So, who are we? What do we do? I believe first and foremost we are still a passionate group of hobbyists exploring technology as a team. Sometimes, from so many different angles it is hard to decide where to begin. But once you begin, the journey keeps getting better and better. Second, we are a tremendous asset as a public service resource. Not just because of the radio on your hip, or your HF station – but especially for the computer between your ears that can be activated, deployed and reliably used for the betterment of your neighborhood, city, county, state and yes even the whole country. What makes this hobby interesting and fun also makes Amateur Radio a Natural Resource. Nearly every day, somewhere in the world Amateur Radio Operators are asked to step in, render aid, report on conditions, design, develop and deploy technology to help save others, save communities – even save lives. The Ham Test Online folks gave us a bunch of bumper stickers that say simply "Ham Radio Saves Lives". It's true and it happens all over the world.

So come to the next club meeting. Learn something new and sit shoulder to shoulder with a fellow "life saver"




#### AUGUST MEETING REPORT THURSDAY, AUGUST 10<sup>TH</sup> 7:30 PM

The August meeting of the Stockton-Delta Amateur Radio Club was held on Thursday August 10th, 7:30PM at the Bear Creek Community Church.

The meeting was called to order by President John NZ6Q who asked everyone to briefly introduce themselves as there were several new members and guests in

attendance. We welcomed Dennis NJ6G President of the Mother-Lode DX Contest Club and his XYL.

In Old Business, the club thanked Dave N6LHL for the use of the Beach Club for the July meeting. Dave offered the use of the site for CQP on October 7th & 8th. ## California QSO Party

1600 UTC Saturday October 7th - 2200 UTC Sunday October 8th

The California QSO Party (CQP) is held every year on the first weekend of October. The first CQP took place in 1966. Since 1974, the Northern California Contest Club (NCCC) has sponsored CQP. CQP has traditionally opened the annual contest season by providing an opportunity for contesters to prepare for the ARRL November Sweepstakes since the format is similar.

Stations outside of California, worldwide, work stations in California only. The 58 counties of CA are the <u>multipliers</u>. California stations work all stations in or out of CA. The 50 US states and 8 Canadian areas are the multipliers. Stations outside of Canada and the US add to one's QSO total but do not count as multipliers. See the full set of <u>CQP Rules</u> for more details.

#### New Repeater on the Air in the Stockton Area K6KJQ 147.105Mhz

Glen K6KJQ has a new VHF repeater on the air @ 147.105 MHz with an offset of 600kc up. The PL is 94.8 Hz.

Coverage may be considered low level, but field testing will tell. The receiving antenna is at 185 feet and the transmit antenna is at 85 feet on a tower just east of downtown Stockton. Work is in progress to install a preamp to the receiver.



N6LHL was full quieting, using his HT, standing in his front yard about 10 miles from the antenna. Coverage is expected to range over multiple counties. It is recommended to program "Decode" or CTCSS for PL into your radio for this repeater. Like the club repeater, distant repeaters can be heard at times on the same frequency. Using CTCSS "Decode" will help minimize that interference.

Give it a try, and tell Glen your location and how well you hear it.

The repeater consists of a Motorola MSF-5000, Andrew commercial antennas, 1/2" Heliax feedline and N connectors.


#### USS Lucid – Help Wanted and Needed

Elmer University sessions are an opportunity for the new ham to learn how to purchase and / or program their first radio, to discover some of the many opportunities there are in Amateur Radio to "find your world" and give the any ham just the chance to ask questions and get on the air. New hams, who got their license at a previous HamCram session can come back and learn the basics of the hobby from patient Elmers from local clubs.

The class is structured with 20 to 50 minute classroom sessions in the morning followed by a break for lunch. After lunch there are demonstrations of HF Operating, Morse Code and finally a panel discussion featuring "Elmers" in an ask anything "wrap-up".

Topics include: Programming and using HTs, How Repeaters Work, Digital Modes and Mesh Networking, Ham Speak (How to Sound Like you know What You are Doing), Using Anderson Power poles, building simple antennas, contesting, chasing DX, and Public Service / Public Safety Communications.

The club also operates a UHF repeater located in downtown Stockton **444.575MHz +** with a PL 107.2Hz. Coverage includes the Stockton area as well as parts of Lodi, Manteca, Tracy and Ripon.
