ARES News and the Ground Truth

Hello all we are slowly growing ARES into a group with can be a useful tool for our Local and State Emergency Managers.

October will see the Great California Shakeout exercise as a "**Ground Truth**" report for the United States Geological Service, especially if you take the time to fill out the Did-You-Feel-Report, either on the web or in WinLink.

Even if you are not a member of ARES or any other group if there is quake and you feel it please fill out a DYFI report.

Recent bad weather had a sighted tornado sighting. It was called in by Mike, K6ANN. Mike is a registered member of SKYWARN and a registered and trained reporter to the NWS.

This training is available to anyone from the Nation Weather Service and comes at no cost to you. These reports represent a valuable "**Ground Truth**" report to the NWS.

Training to be a SKYWARN member can be found here as an on-line class and test.

September was National Preparedness Month. Is your station prepared for emergencies? Do you have a go-box ready? Don't forget personal supplies in addition to your radios, extra batteries. Keep in mind the October Great Shake Out. Pencil in the Date October 20<sup>th</sup> on your calendars. The USGS will be looking for ground truth information from the drill.

Remember the goal is to be Amateur Operator that is trained to fill the seat of professional communicator. We all need the standard ICS-100, 700, 200 and 800 certificates. Those are all on-classes. Before any Emergency Manager will allow you to volunteer, you must have those minimum classes. That is so we understand the framework and standardize language used.


#### HAMCRAM/VE SESSION OCTOBER 8<sup>TH</sup> AT 8:00 AM

The California QSO Party is this coming weekend – October 1st & 2nd!

The first CQP took place in 1966. Since 1974, the Northern California Contest Club (NCCC) has sponsored CQP. CQP has traditionally opened the annual contest season by providing an opportunity for contesters to prepare for the ARRL November Sweepstakes since the format is similar.

Stations outside of California, worldwide, work stations in California only. The 58 counties of CA are the <u>multipliers</u>. California stations work all stations in or out of CA. The 50 US states and 8 Canadian areas are the multipliers. Stations outside of Canada and the US add to one's QSO total but do not count as multipliers. See the full set of <u>CQP Rules</u> for more details.

If you are a new ham, or you just want to have fun on the radio with a bunch of hams, a group from the club sets up in Mariposa County at Barrett Cove / Lake McClure and operates from Friday morning through Sunday night. The contest starts at 9:00 AM on Saturday, October 1st through 3:00 PM on Sunday, October 2nd. John NZ6Q, Annie N6ACL, Joyce K6QBQ and others lead the group, and anyone is welcome to join. You can come up Friday and help with set up, stay and operate and "test things out". Then stay through the weekend. Extra campsites are available. Contact John at nz6q@arrl.net for more information.

In CQP, California becomes the "DX" and it's a great introduction to contesting and being on the "hunted" end of the radio. If you're new to HF, Contesting or even just Ham Radio, don't worry there will be plenty of help. Come for an hour - stay the full weekend.

#### National Fire Prevention Week Special Event October 9<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup> On-THE-AIR

On behalf of the Stockton Fire Department Amateur Radio Club, **W6SFD**, you're invited to participate as the special event station N6F. The link to the signup sheet is below. You

may operate Voice, Data (including FT8), or CW depending on your license privileges.

You will be using the call **N6F** for this event. "**CQ CQ N6F Fire Prevention Week Special Event Station**". Please remember <u>a special event call does not impart any operating privileges.</u> You must operate within your own license privileges or that of a control operator, if present. All N6F stations must transmit from within California. The rules require giving out the call of the holder of N6F once an hour, so give out your call (i.e. NZ6Q) at least once an hour (see instructions). Please give out a fire safety tip as often as possible, that is the main point of this event. There is a link to the safety tips at <a href="www.hamfire.com">www.hamfire.com</a> There is also a link on the sign-up sheet for N6F.

There should be only one station on the same band/mode at the same time. Therefore, select available band/mode slots on the signup sheet and operate only those you have selected. You can select pre-planned times or look for and select any available times during the event. If there is a call entered in a slot, you should assume they are on whether you can hear them or not. If for some reason you are not able to operate at a time previously selected, please remove your call from the signup sheet so it will be available for someone else. Please note some of the slots only require you to enter your call while others require you to also enter the band you will be on. Once you have entered your data in an open slot it is yours to operate.

EXAMPLE: **N6ACL** would be entered on 40M Phone "SLOT" at the date and time she wants to be on the air. Then operate on that band and mode at that time.

#### SCHOOL CLUB ROUND-UP FALL SEMESTER OCTOBER 17<sup>TH</sup> – 22<sup>ND</sup>

School Club Roundup is an amateur radio event for clubs and individuals, especially those that are

associated with elementary, middle, junior high, or high schools, or colleges. The objective is to give young people experience with on-air activity in a contest-like format by exchanging QSO information with any amateur radio stations. Everyone can participate and you'll hear clubs on the air most anytime during the weeklong event.


**The exchange** is simple: Your call sign, signal report and "Class" (Individual, Club, or School), and your state. The club operator gives you the same information. Many young operators will pause and tell you about their school or their club. They earn points by working you (and visa versa).

**QSO Points**: Stations may be contacted once per band and mode on phone, CW, and digital (packet, RTTY, PSK and other modes count as digital). No repeater contacts except satellite and "real time" digital. Count 1 point for each phone QSO and 2 points for each CW or digital QSO. ("Real time" digital includes the use of digipeaters and network nodes, but not store and forward bulletin boards or mailboxes.)

So get on the air and help these young hams win their own School Club Round-up awards.

Each 5-day event runs Monday through Friday from 1300 UTC Monday through 2359 UTC Friday. A station may operate no more than 6 hours in a 24-hour period, and a maximum of 24 hours of the 107 hour event.





# Be Part of the County-Wide Exercise Thursday October 20<sup>th</sup> at 10:20 AM

As part of the Great California Shake-Out, Club members and ARES Members will be included along with other Disaster Health Volunteers in a county-wide drill for the Great California Shake Out.

More information from our San Joaquin County Emergency Coordinator Bob N6TCE.

A SET is short for Simulated Emergency Training.

On October 20<sup>th</sup> at 10:20 AM is the Great California Shake-Out. The Shake-Out takes place to generate Earthquake Awareness and disaster preparedness. Unfortunately, we do live in an area where large quakes do happen. They can be as devastating to our communities as any hurricane or tornado.

The Net Control Station will start a controlled net on either the Stockton (147.165.0 + offset PL107.2) or the Lodi (147.090 + offset PL 114.8) repeater. We will be using two repeaters for the event. More details will follow at the W6SF Club Meeting and on the ARES Tuesday night Nets.

The Net Control Station (NTS) will start by formally opening the net with the words: "This is an Exercise." After the initial announcement, the NCS will call for reports. Next, listen to the NCS instructions on what should be in your reports.

There are four levels of message precedence:

- 1. Emergency (Relating to the immediate protection of life or property)
- 2. Priority (Partners and ARES®messages directly related to the emergency, but not as time-sensitive as an emergency precedence message)
- 3. Health and Welfare (Inquiries or information about the whereabouts or condition of persons in the affected area)
- 4. Routine (Messages unrelated to any emergency: birthday greetings, net activity reports, etc.)

The Net Control Station will ask for Emergency Traffic 1st. Then Priority 2nd, Welfare traffic 3rd, and Routine 4th.

The Net Director would set up alternate frequencies in a genuine emergency and move the routine and welfare traffic off the Main Net frequencies. However, for this SET, we will not be doing do that. Therefore, the NCS will not take routine or welfare traffic during this exercise.

Remember, this is an exercise; a drill is a chance to practice everyone's skills. You, as participants, can do more than check-in. For example, you might decide to practice copying call signs, and if you are doing well at that, try to copy the traffic.

Traffic itself will be the questions: Did you feel it? Y/N Severity? Any visible damage in your location? Y/N Are utilities functioning? Y/N

Not everyone will answer all the questions. For example, might you hear an answer to only the 1st or the 1st and last two questions?

I have included a possible log sheet, and everyone is welcome to print it off and practice logging.

This exercise is constructed upon something which has been well attended in the past. The only thing different is we will be treated as simulated emergency training. The difference is this exercise will be set up using the National Incident Management System's (NIMS's) ICS forms and reported more formally than it has in the past.

One of the things that could impact us in San Joaquin County is that our surrounding counties may be depending on us to help them immediately or to prepare for a significant influx of evacuees or casualties. in times of emergencies. We also may be asked to send volunteers. For that we need more training and more certified Level 2 personnel with the ability to be deployed in mutual aid situations like wild fires, flooding or earthquakes.

To volunteer for deployment outside of the county, you must have the 4 ICS classes finished. In addition, participating in a simulated emergency net will help prepare you for real-life call-outs.

You should also take time to assess how well you and your family is prepared for an emergency?

Do you have a family plan?

Do you have a rallying point or a planned gathering place for everyone to meet?

How well is your home Quake resistant?

Do you know where the major gas and electric lines are in your neighborhood?

Do you know how to shut off the gas to your house?

Your workplace or business can also claim credit as participating in the Great California Shake-Out Drill just by allowing you to check-in on the net and having you share information with your co-workers. Ask your manager or supervisor – ask Bob N6TCE if you need more information.

#### REMEMBER: BE ON THE AIR October 20 at 10:20 AM





The CQ WW is the largest Amateur Radio competition in the world. Over 35,000 participants take to the airwaves on the last weekend of October (SSB) and November (CW) with the goal of making as many contacts with as many different DXCC entities and CQ Zones as possible.

#### Starts 00:00:00 UTC Saturday Ends 23:59:59 UTC Sunday

#### **Translations**

- **I. OBJECTIVE:** For amateurs around the world to contact as many other amateurs in as many CQ zones and countries as possible.
- **II. BANDS:** Six bands only: 1.8, 3.5, 7, 14, 21 and 28 MHz. Observance of established band plans is strongly encouraged.
- **III. CONTEST EXCHANGE:** SSB: RS report plus CQ Zone number of the station location (e.g., 59 05). CW: RST report plus CQ Zone (e.g., 599 05).

#### IV. SCORING:

- **A. Score:** The final score is the result of the total QSO points multiplied by the sum of zone and country multipliers. Example: 1000 QSO points \* (30 Zones + 70 Countries) = 100,000 (final score).
- **B. QSO Points:** Stations may be contacted once on each band. QSO points are based on the location of the station worked.
  - 1. Contacts between stations on different continents count three (3) points.
  - 2. Contacts between stations on the same continent but in different countries count one (1) point. Exception: Contacts between stations in different countries within the North American boundaries count two (2) points.
  - 3. Contacts between stations in the same country have zero (0) QSO point value, but count for zone and country multiplier credit.
- **C. Multiplier:** There are two types of multipliers.
  - 1. Zone: A multiplier of one (1) for each different CQ Zone contacted on each band. The CQ Worked All Zones rules are the standard.
  - 2. Country: A multiplier of one (1) for each different country contacted on each band. The DXCC entity list, Worked All Europe (WAE) multiplier list plus IG9/IH9, and continental boundaries are the standards for defining country multipliers. Maritime mobile stations count only for a zone multiplier.

#### **V. ENTRY CATEGORIES:**

- **A. Single Operator Categories:** One person (the operator) performs all operating and logging functions. There is no limit on operating time or band changes. Only one transmitted signal is permitted at any time.
- 1. Single Operator: QSO finding assistance of any kind is prohibited (see VIII.2).
- **a. High Power (All Band or Single Band):** Total output power must not exceed **1500 watts**.
- b. Low Power (All Band or Single Band): Total output power must not exceed 100 watts.
- c. QRP (All Band or Single Band): Total output power must not exceed 5 watts.
- **2. Single Operator Assisted:** Entrants in this category may use QSO finding assistance (see VIII.2).
- a. High Power Assisted (All Band or Single Band): Total output power must not exceed 1500 watts.
- **b. Low Power Assisted (All Band or Single Band):** Total output power must not exceed **100 watts**.
- c. QRP Assisted (All Band or Single Band): Total output power must not exceed 5 watts.
- **B. Single Operator Overlay Categories:** Any Single Operator entrant who meets the requirements may ALSO enter one of the categories shown below by adding the appropriate CATEGORY-OVERLAY line in the Cabrillo log file header. Overlay category entries will be listed separately in the results; scored as All Bands; and grouped by High Power and Low Power (includes QRP).
- **1. Classic Operator (CLASSIC):** The entrant will use only one radio, no QSO finding assistance, and may operate up to 24 of the 48 hours **off times are a minimum of 60 minutes during which no QSO is logged.** If the log shows more than 24 hours of operation, only the first 24 hours will be counted for the overlay score. Receiving while transmitting is prohibited. Single Operator Assisted entries are not eligible for this category.
- **2. Rookie (ROOKIE):** The operator was first licensed as a radio amateur less than three (3) years before the date of the contest. Indicate the date first licensed in the SOAPBOX field. Previous Rookie winners are ineligible for plaques in this category.
- **3. Youth (YOUTH):** The operator was 25 years old or younger at the start of the contest. Indicate the birth year in the SOAPBOX field.
